their legs either before or after tasting.” Water and peanut butter treats are provided.

Riley holds court at Hightower Cellars because the owners, Tim and Kelly, believe that dogs are integral to the winemaking operation. Murray, Riley’s half-brother, appears on the labels of both Murray Red and Murray White wines.

Dogs can play off-leash outside or accompany their humans into the tasting room where there is a water bowl.

Oakwood Cellars owner Eppie Skelton asks that dogs are leashed when visiting because although this winery doesn’t have a dog, it does have a cat—Tigger Boots, a Manx, who plays with the wine corks and will throw them back to you. Her image will appear on the next estate Riesling label.

Barnard Griffin Winery not only welcomes canines, but also supports them through a partnering with the local Humane Society.

Upon entering the tasting room, plan on being greeted by Rio, an eight-year-old Golden Retriever who comes to work with his mistress, Kim Gravenslund. He’ll show visiting dogs where the bowl of reserve agua is kept, and there are no tasting fees for that agua. Rio appeared on the label of Barnard Griffin’s 2005 Vino Roso, and a portion of the sales from that wine went to the local Humane Society; the wine out was so popular it sold out.

At this year’s San Francisco Chronicle’s Wine Competition, the largest wine competition in the world, Barnard Griffin walked away with two double gold awards—one for their 2006 Cabernet Sauvignon Reserve and the other for their 2007 Syrah, Columbia Valley.

Besides enjoying visiting all of these fabulous wineries, dogs will salivate at the new dog park at Badger Mountain.
